Vulcan Flyover

On Monday 20th July, the last flying Vulcan bomber roared across the skies of Northamptonshire on one of its final flights.

The iconic aircraft, XH558, flew over large swathes of Northamptonshire in circles from 2pm to 4pm at a low height and close to our village, as part of an event at Sywell Aerodrome.

The aircraft is currently in what is expected to be its final season of flying air displays, and it is expected to retire in October.

The 60 year old Avro Vulcan is an iconic example of British aerospace engineering at its world-beating best. Its impressive list of technical achievements includes being the first successful large delta wing aircraft, leading directly to Concorde and the Space Shuttle, and delivering performance and agility so close to a jet fighter's that it was given a fighter-style control column in place of the traditional bomber pilot's yoke. That agility allowed XH558 to deliver amazing air displays, which unfortunately must finish this year as her time as a flying aircraft draws to an end.

For those fortunate to see this amazing aircraft so close, it was worthy of considerable interest and record by video and photograph.

### From the Chair

### New Parish Councillor

The Parish Council has always been concerned that its make up (mainly men; usually not quite as young as they were - or would like to be) does not reflect the profile of the village.

So we are pleased to welcome Katie Wilson to be one of your Councillors. Katie is a young woman who has lived in the village for five years, so I guess she has a different perspective on village life; on what the village needs/wants to happen and change; and a younger age range of friends and contacts than current Councillors have.

Nonetheless I do wish that villagers would tell the Parish Council what they wish the Council would do. If you don't then we have to do what we think you want; not always the same. I know I keep saying this, but that's only because a) it is true, and b) people seldom do.

#### The Community Fund

And now for something completely different. The Parish Council manages the village Community Fund; this being the pot of money that the developers granted to the village to support the development of social activities and facilities. There is still £6,500 available, and any village group can apply for a grant from the Fund. The key requirements are that the project must be of benefit to the village as a whole, and that at least 25% of the total project cost must come from other sources (i.e. the group's own funds, and/or grants from other donors).

# The Adoption Process

Parish Council has clearly documented the negative effects of our village remaining un-adopted and the on-going dependence on the builders for basic maintenance rather than our entitlement for adoption by the local authorities.

Our reports and concerns have been made known about the lack of a regulated adoption programme with the developers, loosely assembled planning agreements and communications issues between the respective planning departments of Kettering Borough, Northamptonshire County Councils and our councillors.

### Taylor Wimpey.

Against this background and without direct responsibility and empowerment, we have been able to influence progress in close liaison with Chris Leeson, the Technical Director of Taylor Wimpey who has facilitated the programme of road works and consultation with senior NCC Highways and planning engineers.

As a result of Chris Leeson's dedicated support we have benefited from an improved routine maintenance service on street lighting, landscape and road gritting in the winter months with the completion in December 2014 of the extensive road works programme which was started in 2010.

In recent months we have been advised that TW have progressively transferred the legal and landscaping maintenance of most of their locations over to KBC, with the exception of small pockets of grassed areas for which TW have committed to remain responsible until the completion of the adoption.

The full adoption is subject to protracted legal and technical issues between TW and the landowner and in particular, a settlement on the storm water drainage onto the land at the north of the village, known as the 'lagoon'

### David Wilson Homes.

DWH will not be able to transfer full adoption of the roads and sewers until a settlement is reached on the storm water drainage on the other Phases under TWs responsibilities.

Following on from the problems that were experienced with the grass cutting in some locations, we have now requested to DWH and KBC that they seek a resolution on the problem with their negotiations on the settlement of a sum of money, required by KBC before they will accept the transfer of responsibility and maintenance on Public Open Spaces.

As a result of these recent events, we have been promised an updated report and follow up from Mr Trevor Rockley, the Technical Director of DWH which will also include the status on their action plans for full adoption under the standards set by NCC, together with an improvement in communications and regular feedback from our KBC and NCC councillors.

# Northants Best Village

Well, I regret to say that the results of the Northamptonshire Best Village competition were a little disappointing. We received a "Highly Commended" award in the large village section.

Congratulations to Weedon Bec, who were the overall winners.

Does it matter? No, not really. Perhaps not at all!

But we viewed the competition as a way of getting recognition of everything that we have achieved, and so many worked so hard for, to make Mawsley an enjoyable place to live. Actually, in many ways I think it is remarkable that our village, which didn't exist 15 years ago, is even able to make a creditable entry.

Anyway, just look around you; look at what goes on in the village; look at the range of facilities, leisure and fun opportunities Mawsley offers. Perhaps that alone should be recognition enough!

# Visibility problems from village.

Please be aware that the problem with visibility to oncoming traffic from the right, at the Loddington Way and Broughton Road junctions to the C31 was reported to Northamptonshire County Council Street Doctor [Ref:751236]

This was necessary because of concerns and 'near misses' reported by residents and although the grass verges have been cut back previously, we have requested that further action is required and that the heavier vegetation and trees are cut back to improve the vision and distance range.

This work has now been carried out and has made a significant improvement on the visibility range of oncoming traffic and hopefully, more safety awareness.

# **Road Safety**

Those of you who have children who attend our village school will already know that for many, many months we have been discussing road safety issues with Taylor Wimpey, our Parish Council and our District and County Councillor.

I recently reported to parents/carers and our Parish Council that school governors are now satisfied that Taylor Wimpey has done all that it is required to do and more, to fulfil its obligations and we also know that we do not meet the Highways Authority's criteria for a school crossing or other road improvements. Taylor Wimpey has offered us £500 to use to reinforce road safety messages and we will be discussing the best way to spend this money.

When our roads are finally adopted we will again be pressing for road safety improvements, including a crossing, when we raise this matter again with our District and County Council.

Road safety is everyone's responsibility. Road safety education is part of the school curriculum and we regularly highlight any concerns we have when we write to parents/carers in the school newsletter.

In September we will be reviewing our school's Travel Plan and we will be inviting parents/carers and other village stakeholders to join us in this task.

Road safety in our village and wherever we are, **must** be everyone's top priority whether we are walking, skateboarding, roller-skating, cycling or driving.

Tip for early September – Plant spring flowering bulbs in groups between shrubs and herbaceous plants, removing tired summer-flowering bedding plants as you work. Prepare pots and bowls of bulbs for indoor flowering and put them in a dark, frost free place to encourage strong root growth. Bring them into the light in two or three months time.

# Taylor Wimpey meets school head and governors to discuss road safety



Taylor Wimpey is working with Mawsley Community Primary School to look at the issue of road safety in the roads surrounding the school.

Christopher Leeson, Technical Director of Taylor Wimpey East Midlands, and Phil Brown, of JPP Consulting, met school governors and head Elaine Wright to discuss children's safety at the beginning and end of each school day.

Taylor Wimpey has been working with Northamptonshire County Council's highways department to determine if any retrospective traffic calming measures or crossing points are required, in recognition of the fact that the school's demographic structure and intake has expanded and traffic flows have increased at school drop-off and pick-up times.

A number of investigations have taken place over the last six months – including a site wide performance report by JPP Consulting, vehicle speed surveys within the village and a road safety audit undertaken by independent representatives of the highways authority – and these have confirmed the robust nature of the road pattern and design.



Nevertheless, concerns for the safety of children are still paramount to both Taylor Wimpey and the school. The housebuilder has agreed financial support for the school's road safety campaign to advise and educate road and pavement users, including new safety signs in the vicinity of the school.

# Nature on your doorstep

 – a stroll round Mawsley & District with Les and Paul (and on this occasion no dog, no wives but accompanied by Golf Clubs)

Yes we were taking a stroll round Pytchley Golf Lodge golf course seeing if we could catch sight of any Birdies, not expecting to see any Eagles, Condors or Albatrosses but more likely Thrushes and Robins.

We were not disappointed Pied Wagtails were there aplenty bobbing along gracefully spread out over the large expanses of fairway feasting on tasty small insects. Interesting to think that now nesting was over and done with they would all be gathering together in large numbers around Tesco's on the opposite side of the A14 of an evening to keep warm and safe.



Swallows soared around us dipping low over the greens hoping to beat the wagtails to the rich food source and taking a drink on the wing from the ponds.

As we wandered along it was interesting to note that despite being within a few hundred yards of the busy road and Kettering town beyond many of our common mammals including Hares, Foxes, Badgers, Moles, Voles and the green keepers nightmare Rabbit were making a living from the lush open space.

A large dragonfly rose from a ditch in a flash of greenish blue. The ponds here boast of large Carp that can be seen on sunny days rising to gulp down a bug or two but alas not today. Frogs, Toads and Newts also live there and provide food for visiting Herons and grass snakes.

Back on the driving range as we knocked our balls out Les and I saw all 3 of our locally common members of the crow family, Rook, Carrion Crow and Magpie feeding on the large open green expanse without a care, golf balls landing all around them! Incredible that all this wonderful wildlife thrives just because we human beings for some reason feel the need to hit little white balls down little holes with sticks. Long may it continue.

While Paul was looking at the wildlife, I noticed that there were very few mature trees in the area, quite understandably as the course was obviously fully landscaped not too long ago. However, there was a good stand of young horse chestnut trees down the main drive which I saw were, unusually, completely free from signs of damage by the leaf miner moth. These little critters so

damage the leaves of the chestnut tree that by the end of September a good proportion of them look brown and blotchy as though winter is setting in early. I am sure many of you will have seen the huge chestnut trees down one side of the Towcester Road into Northampton which will be looking very sorry for themselves at the moment due to this damage.



Younger trees seem not to be so vulnerable and I hope that this can also be said for Ash Die Back disease which is another fairly new scourge, this time caused by a virus. Certainly the 10-12 year old Ash in the Spinney here in Mawsley seem not to be suffering and Paul and I are keeping an eye on what might be happening in Old Poor's Gorse where there are some Ash trees which must be over 100 years old – we hope to have more on this wood in the next News & Views.

# History on our doorstep

With apologies to historians

#### How Civil Can Any War Be?

Everyone loved Shakespeare, but not the monarchy following the death of Good Queen Bess. Through the early 17<sup>th</sup> Century there was conflict between the less than loyal subjects and the monarchs who believed they



ruled by divine right – that is, they had been determined to be a monarch by a dowser.

(Editor's Note: Dowsers still remain a useful person to know in present day Mawsley if you have lost your Water Meter).

By 1642 there was open rebellion and those supporting their elected representatives (the Parliamentarians or, rather rudely, the Roundheads) were being very civil in their fight against the Royalist supporters (or Cavaliers, named after the awful locally



made mode of transport they preferred). After a number of inconclusive battles between the two groups it was decided that future engagements would be co-ordinated by a new and autonomous body – FIFA (Fighting In Fields Anywhere) which would be headed by a charismatic

figure called Sebastian Batter. FIFA determined that each and every Parish across the Britain should be able to bid to host a battle between the Roundheads and Cavaliers and so it was that the Parish of Malasleau, led by its Chairman (for there was no need to be politically 17<sup>th</sup> correct in the Century) came to the attention of the warring parties.

In a presentation to the FIFA Executive in early 1645, Richard O'Cromwell (Chairman of Malasleau Parish Council) outlined the proposal for hosting The Battle Of Malasleau with a scheduled date of 14<sup>th</sup> June 1645. The proposal appeared to be received well, the only competition being from the nearby hamlet of Naseby. Richard O'Cromwell was able to offer sufficient fields for

tented villages to accommodate the competitors, having struck land sharing deals with the neighbouring Parishes of Cransley, Broughton and Loddington; food and drink that would be available through The Great Bustard at reasonable rates; and, as a result of some night-time tree felling in Malasleau Wood, clear land was available to accommodate a battle between armies of up to 5,000 on each side. Naseby's bid seemed to stumble when it was pointed out that there was a hill involved that would give one tented village an advantage over the other. However FIFA worked in mysterious ways and, very late on in the process, started adding restrictions such as:

- Only locally brewed ale could be provided to the competitors before and after the battle;
- Local Public Houses had to agree to change their names to reflect the eventual winner of any battle; and
- The battle site had to sound as if it was in Britain and not France.

On all of these points Malasleau would not compromise – The Great Bustard would always be named as such; it would always serve Belgian beers; and, was it not Edward 1<sup>st</sup> who had given the village its name? (Editors Note: See Part 4 of Mawsley, The Nearly Village). FIFA retired to consider their verdict.

In the early hours of the 31<sup>st</sup> May 1645 FIFA came to a decision awarding the forthcoming battle to Naseby and, to this day, there remains animosity between the two villages (if either can be truly called such) as to how FIFA arrived at this decision. The fact that the pub in Naseby changed its name from "The Puritan" to "The Royal Oak" on the 30<sup>th</sup> May and that Seb Batter was given freedom of the Parish on the same day is claimed to have nothing to do with the decision that was taken. Richard O'Cromwell swore to the day he died that "We Was Robbed".

Ultimately Naseby's win was its downfall – in a stunning result the New Model Army of Richard O'Cromwell's distant cousin, Oliver, was victorious and left the Royalist Army shattered. Meanwhile Malasleau continued as a quiet backwater, somewhat better off though for not having had to go to the expense of hosting a war.
